MPs lead by example and take HIV tests in Parliament to mark World AIDS day

Pauline Latham MP, Simon Kirby MP, and Mike Weatherly MP all took HIV tests on World AIDS day in support of the "Halve it" campaign to halve the rate of late and undiagnosed HIV in the UK by 2015. APPG Vice-Chair

Simon Kirby said: "It is frightening to hear that in 2011, 30 years after the

discovery of the virus, a quarter of people living with HIV in the UK do not know that they have it. I hope by taking HIV tests here in Parliament on World



AIDS day we can help to encourage other people to go out and get tested." APPG Chair Pamela Nash was filmed having a HIV test, a move which she hopes will tackle the stigma surrounding the virus.



Making sure that HIV is prioritised in the new NHS: The Public Health Outcomes Framework

Following the publication of the Public Health White Paper, the Department of Health has produced its draft Public Health Outcomes Framework. This proposes a set of indicators which Local Authorities and their partners will be

measured against when they take over responsibilities for Public Health from April 2013. In order to secure the resources that we need to tackle the challenge of late and undiagnosed HIV in the UK, it is crucial that the

final list of outcome indicators includes the indicator for late HIV diagnosis. MPs and Peers have been raising this issue with ministers and we are keeping our fingers crossed for a positive response in the New Year!

House of Lords report that current policies to tackle HIV are “woefully inadequate”

After a 9 month detailed inquiry, The House of Lord’s Select Committee on HIV in the UK Chaired by APPG Vice-Chair Lord Fowler concluded that current policies to tackle HIV in the UK are “woefully inadequate.”

The report recommended that much greater efforts should be placed on HIV

prevention, highlighting that the UK Government currently spends over **£792** million on HIV prevention and only **£3** million on HIV treatment. The Government has accepted some of the report’s recommendations,

and has promised to review the legalisation of

home HIV testing kits, but has not committed to spending any more on HIV prevention at a national level.

Next year the Department of Health will publish its long awaited **Sexual Health Policy Framework**, which will be informed by the recommendations of the Lord’s Committee.

Foundation established to honour David Cairns MP

Following the tragic and untimely death of APPG Chair David Cairns, The David Cairns Foundation has been set up in his honour, and held its first annual dinner on the 23rd November. The event raised a staggering £30,000,

with some donations going towards the campaign against sexual minorities in Uganda, a cause which was very close to David’s heart following his visit to Uganda in January. The APPG is planning to hold its



memorial lecture to commemorate David’s passion and dedication to promoting human rights and advocating for the rights of people living with HIV in Spring 2012.

AIDS Support- Where is the money Going?

Last year the APPG campaigned for money allocated towards HIV-related social care to be ring-fenced. In this financial year, 2011-12, whilst over **£25.5 million** has been allocated to local

authorities, HIV support groups and Social Workers have been contacting their MPs and the APPG to express concern that this money is being siphoned away from HIV-related social

care. With budgets for next year currently being set APPG members will be asking questions to make sure that this money is going to be spent on valued services for people living with HIV.

New evidence brings prospect of bringing an end to AIDS much closer

The results of a remarkable clinical trial in June proved that HIV treatment can be **96%** effective in preventing the transmission of HIV.

UNAIDS has also produced a new model called the Investment Framework, which highlights how implementation of evidence based interventions can save **7 million lives** and avert **12 million new**

infections by 2020.

Modelling shows how cost effective these interventions are, with the investments more than paying for itself in 10 years. In November US Secretary of State Hillary Clinton announced that the intentions of the US Government to lead global efforts to defeat the HIV and AIDS pandemic, saying that “The Goal of an **AIDS-free**

generation is ambitious. But it is possible, with the knowledge and the interventions that we have now.”

Addressing APPG members and supporters on World AIDS day, DFID Minister Alan Duncan said that that “Never before have we been in a realistic position to seriously articulate and work towards this ambition of getting towards Zero new HIV infections, Zero discrimination, and zero Deaths.”

Against this backdrop of hope, however, came the news that international funding to tackle HIV and AIDS has fallen dramatically.

Crisis at the Global Fund to fight AIDS, TB and Malaria as no new money available for HIV drugs until 2014

The world’s largest financier of HIV medication which has saved over 6 million lives since it was founded in 2002 is under threat as donors fail to fulfil their pledges in the wake of the global economic crisis. The UK Government has been paying its contributions to the Global Fund on time, but we need other

donors to play their part and pay up on time to ensure that the 9million people around the world are able to access the living saving medicines that they need. As Secretary of State Andrew Mitchell has said, “We should not balance our books on the backs of the World’s poor.”

First Pharmaceutical company joins the Medicines Patent Pool.. But others fail to follow suit

In July 2011, Gilead became the first Pharmaceutical company to join the Medicines Patent Pool, signing a licence agreement which has real potential to speed up the availability of Anti-Retroviral drugs in the developing world.

Several other companies are in negotiation with the Patent Pool, although Johnson and Johnson has announced that it will not be entering into a formal licensing agreement with the Pool, a move which has been criticised by Access to medicines campaigners, and which APPG Chair Pamela Nash MP described as “very disappointing.”

Teaching Young People the Facts about HIV

The APPG has been highlighting the importance of comprehensive sex and relationships education and the importance of teaching young people about HIV in schools. School Minister Nick Gibb admitted during his evidence session to the House of Lord's Select Committee that the fact that 1 in 4 young people did not learn anything about HIV in schools is **"unforgivable."**

Speaking in a Westminster Hall debate on Sex and Relationships education, Pamela Nash said: **"Young people simply are not learning the facts about HIV and AIDS, and that has to change if we are to make any headway in reversing the number of new infections."**

Parliamentarians inspired by HIV positive Speakers

Three HIV positive speakers brought their powerful and inspirational stories of how living with HIV has impacted upon their lives to APPG members and supporters. Mohammad from the Gambia spoke about the inequalities in access to treatment, highlighting that there are currently more than 9 million people around the globe who do not have access to HIV treatment, and urged Pharmaceutical companies to join the

Medicines Patent Pool. Victor from Nigeria talked about the challenges of living as a Gay HIV positive man in Nigeria, where he could be sent to prison for

being open about his sexuality.

Leasuwan from Bedford gave a moving account of overcoming the stigma and discrimination that she encountered as she began to tell her family and friends about her HIV status.
